He was a resident artist at Brooklyn Artist Exchange and performed at the New Museum, BAM, PPOW Gallery, La MAMA, the Queer NY International Art Festival and the Queens Museum of Art.

Nicole Wallace, author of the chapbook, WAASAMOWIN (IMP, 2019), was the June/July 2020 poetry micro-resident at Running Dog and a 2019 Poets House Emerging Poets Fellow. They are a member of the Indigenous Kinship Collective and Managing Director of The Poetry Project. Recent work can be read in Survivance: Indigenous Poesis Vol. IV Zine and online at Running Dog, A Perfect Vacuum, and LitHub. Originally from Gakaabikaang, Minnesota, Nicole is of mixed settler/European ancestry and is a descendent of the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa (Ojibwe). They live on unceded, occupied Canarsee and Lenape territory (Brooklyn, NY). Chang Yuchen is an artist based in New York. She works in an interdisciplinary manner—writing as weaving, drawing as translation, teaching as hospitality and commerce as everyday revolution (see Use Value). By constantly entering and exiting each medium, she strolls against the category of things, the labor division among people. Yuchen was an artist in residence at NARS x Governors Island, MASS MoCA, Offshore, MAD Museum and more. She has shown/performed her works at UCCA Dune, Taikwun Contemporary, Abrons Art Center, Para Site, Salt Projects, Assembly Room and etc. She teaches through Center for Book Arts, Printed Matter, Asia Art Archive in America and more.

With a PhD in Poetics from SUNY Buffalo, she adjuncts at NYU and CUNY, and freelance book designs.
